Introduction

Monoku are in the haiku family. As with many shapes of poetry, it has at its core observational wit, paying attention, and mapping the inner to the outer. The aspect I like of monoku is its minimalist density. It may flash as a sequin, or acknowledge long slow truths but it doesn't have room to meander. It's an engineering micro-marvel, opening within a readers' mind. There's a tension, two possible readings, based on where you infer the unmarked caesura. Selecting poems and selecting poems that chime off each other are different beasts. Finding a tension and harmony between poems is part of the pleasure of putting a collections together, and of reading one.

Here is the thing. Everything starts with saying yes. Here's another thing. We live in a lucky era. We can read. We can write. We can freely associate. We can publish from our own homes. We can distribute what we like. We can take freedom for granted. And take community as an unquestioned given. To keep both, we have to keep practicing them, engaging and expanding to bring more people in who can hear and want to listen.

When I want to read something that resonates, I can pan for poetry gold randomly, or I can go to people I admire and say, in effect, I like your brain. *Could you send me a poem so I can show a bit of your brain to other people?* It's like holding the hypothetical dinner party but doing it for real. Except for the food. (Feel free to eat as you read. I advise papadams.) Thank you for opting in, to read, and to write and to share.
